Overview



- 4 initial investment countries (\$ 55 m, 4 grantees).
- 10 first response countries (\$ 26.5 m, 38 grantees).
- 78% of January target achieved (excluding Yemen).
- 2 multi-year programmes under development.
- 1 global partners programme (\$2.5 m).

ECW's Multi-year Resilience Window (Purpose)

ECW's flagship funding modality (focus: protracted crisis countries). A call from the WHS, it's about:

- Fostering joint planning and programming in crisis and emergencies to ensure a bigger impact, building on complementarities and partners' added values.
- Bringing together partners to leverage on resources and in-country expertise (ECW serves as a catalyst).
- Strengthening the nexus between humanitarian and development efforts.

Increasing access and continuity



- 4.0 m children targeted (3.1 m initial investments, of which 2.5 m in Yemen, 0.9 m first response).
- Formal and non-formal ECD (6% of children targeted at a specific grade), primary (72%) & secondary (22%)
- 70,000 targeted through non-formal education.
- Addressing demand-side barriers.
- 3 developing NFE accreditation.
- 7 planning to measure access/continuity outcomes.

Improving equity



- Targeting children across conflict lines (Yemen, Syria).
- Support to refugees, IDPs and hosts.
- Reaching out to the poorest (73,216 children targeted).
- Targets on children with disabilities reached (13 grantees).
- Gender equity (see following slide).

Learning



Training teachers (20,466) **but also measuring practices.**

Providing learning materials (1.9 m) **but also measuring use.**

Provision of ECD – so far 8 countries with ECD components but low numerical targets.

Involving communities (training, monitoring).

Measuring learning outcomes: Syria, Afghanistan, CAR, Uganda.

Protection



- Support to safer environments, including planned building of 2,500 gender-sensitive latrines.
- Distribution of sanitary pads (3,700 girls targeted).
- Life skills education & psychosocial support.
- Developing/implementing codes of conduct (3 countries).
- Measurement of protection outcomes in 5 countries.

Building better systems



Focus on initial investments:

- Ethiopia: strengthening refugee integration into the education system.
- Syria: creating a common forum for partners.
- Chad: participatory process, sustainability promotion through community empowerment.
- Yemen: developing a joint programme for all areas of the country.

January 2018 results (outputs)



- 369,346 children reached (171,786 girls, 737 CwDs).
- 104,621 reached through NFE, 29,020 with ECD.
- 265,023 provided with learning materials.
- 52,527 provided with school feeding.
- 2,345 girls reached with sanitary pads.
- 3,726 teachers trained, 2,325 hired/financially supported.

Initial Investments



- All initial investments have started delivering on the ground.
- Chad and Ethiopia: approx. 3 weeks late on main activities.
- Syria: somewhat behind target, but progressing.
- Yemen: reprogramming foreseen.

Joint Multi-Year Programmes



- Protracted crisis countries
- Education cannot wait – it starts now
- Predictable financing
- Learning outcomes in 4 years = early investments
- 8-10 MYP/year - approx. 35 countries by 2021
- SDG4 Target: sustainable quality education by 2030

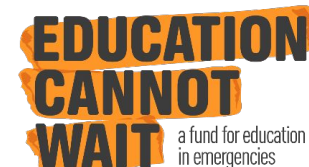
